£1.5 Million New Pathology Department for Royal Lancaster Infirmary

Work on a £1.5 million new pathology department to be built at the Infirmary is scheduled to begin in early October.

It will take 12 months to build and is expected to open in late 1993.

It brings a major improvement in accommodation and facilities for pathology services which are currently operated in three buildings on two hospital sites – at Lancaster Moor Hospital and at the Infirmary.

All microbiology and histopathology work currently done at Lancaster Moor Health will transfer to the purpose-designed department. The modern facilities will provide substantial improvements for the pathology department whose workload exceeds 300,000 requests per year.

Pathology provides scientific services to assist in the diagnosis and treatment of patients. It also provides an advisory service for hospital doctors and GPs and is involved in research projects including cot deaths, heart disease and skin disorders.

The new department will be a two-storey split-level building. There will be a new Histopathology laboratory with some research facilities, a new Microbiology laboratory with better facilities for work involving environmental health and food products. There will be sterilising facilities for equipment and waste disposal, new distribution stores for all laboratories within the Trust, offices for consultants and administration, a seminar room and staff rest facilities.

The new building will be in the south-west of the Infirmary site off Ashton Road between the Unit for the Elderly and the new Phase 3 major building currently under construction.
